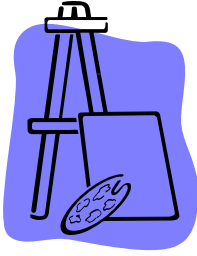
SKIP students are just finishing up a reading incentive from Arby's restaurants. The children read 10 books in the SKIP classroom to earn a free meal from Arby's.

### Working Together for School Success

With spring right around the corner, it can be difficult to keep children focused on learning. What can you do to make school a top priority for your kids? Below are a few simple ideas to keep in mind.

**Attendance:** Let your children know that unless they are sick, they must go to school. Try to schedule routine dentist and doctor appointment after school hours. If possible, take family vacations during school breaks. It is also important your child arrives at school on time. We understand there are times when you are running behind in the morning; however it is important that your child does not arrive to school late on a regular basis.

**Show you care.** You want your children to know that you are interested in their learning. Talk about their school activities and projects. If homework and after-school activities conflict, let your children know the importance of completing their homework either before the activity or after they return from their activity.

**Homework help:** Do your children expect your help with homework? Let them know you are able to help if they need you; however, their homework is their job. The benefit? They will learn to find the answers themselves, as well as boost their skills.

### Beat the morning rush

A calm and happy school morning begins the night before. Below are a few tips to keep in mind to have a smooth morning.

Check the weather forecast and help your child choose clothes, coat, and shoes the night before.

Have your child keep his/her backpack by the door. Be sure they have their homework and take home reading books, and planners in their backpacks.

Review with your child for the next day's quiz/test.

**Tip:** For the child that has a difficult time getting around in the morning, set the timer on your microwave or oven to go off five minutes before your child has to leave in the morning. The timer will be the signal for the child to get last minute items around before leaving in the morning.

## Counseling News, Spring 2010

### Mr. Rickard, Counselor

We have been busy assisting graduating seniors applying for scholarships and finalizing college plans. Other seniors are making plans for the military, trade schools, or entering the work force. Once again, this year's Britton seniors applying to colleges are being accepted at their preferred or first choice school at very high rates.

In March, all juniors, along with seniors who have yet to, will take or retake the MME, or Michigan Merit Exam. This battery of tests includes Michigan reading, writing, math tests, and Work Keys. Also included is the regular ACT with writing. Inclusion of this test results in savings of the \$43 fee normally paid for by students or parents. Test results will be presented and interpreted with these students as soon as they are received. Based on their scores and goals for colleges and scholarships, some college bound juniors may wish to retake the ACT in June to improve their scores. **The filing deadline for the June 13 exam is May 8.** Registration forms are available outside the counseling office. I also have preparation materials and websites to assist students.

Several students will be sponsored by the American Legion and the American Legion Auxiliary to represent Britton at Boy's State and Girl's State at the State Capitol in Lansing in June. Senior Jenna Squires was selected as the D.A.R., (Daughters of the American Revolution) good citizenship award. Congratulations, Jenna.

Scheduling for the 2010-2011 school year will begin soon for high school students. The new scheduling procedure calls for students, who will be in grades 9-12 next year, to make their class selection via e-school, through the HAC. I will meet with classes to explain requirements and choices, have them make selections, then meet again individually to review schedules. Students will then bring them home for parents to review and approve. Please check with your child if, by spring break, you have not yet reviewed your child's plans. Next year's juniors and seniors will also soon have opportunity to select classes at the Tech Center, co-op, work experience, and less-than-class size program applications. **Please carefully review schedules with your child and make desired changes immediately before the end of the school year. Schedule changes after the school year begins can no longer be accommodated due to the fact that classes are appropriated and staffed through student choice.** The scheduling process will begin soon for the middle school.

A reminder to high school parents, especially parents of next year's **Seniors**, Legislation passed in 2004 set new graduation standards and requirements. Starting with the class of 2011, students must successfully complete four years of high school math, three years of science, and one year of health/PE. Two years of foreign language are required. This started with the graduating class of 2016, next year's 7<sup>th</sup> graders. They are once again scheduled for an entire year of Spanish as are the incoming sixth grade class. Several other curriculum changes have been made, and more are planned to meet these new requirements.

There are high school summer classes for credit make up and for enrichment available at Tech this summer. At Britton, we are also again offering summer school for both middle and high school students. Any eighth grade or high school students that failed classes during this school year, **especially this year's freshman**, should be in credit recovery classes to enhance their ability to graduate on time. I will automatically schedule them accordingly. Every effort is made to keep costs affordable for Britton students. Both high school Algebra and English credit recovery classes are scheduled here. For questions, speak with me, or with Stacie McMullen at 451-4581.

Also available at Vo-tech is a series of science camps for students starting with the fifth grade. These camps continue throughout the summer. There are also opportunities for elementary students as well as middle and high school students. Call me for information, or you can contact Lisa Bachman at LISD directly at 265-1659.

A personal note from the counselor: Current economic and social conditions can create tense and stressful conditions for kids and in homes. These past few months, I have been facilitating a number of counseling groups to give students the opportunity to relieve some of the stress by unloading some of the stuff that burdens them. Unfortunately, time does not allow for me to facilitate enough groups or personally counsel all students with needs. However, in an effort to make those services available to students or families in need, I make referrals to other counselors. Additionally, I am partnering with local agencies that come and help here at the school. Feel free to call me regarding needs currently being experienced.

# Vote on the Non-Homestead Millage Renewal

## May 4, 2010

### Maintain the Quality of Our School

On Tuesday, May 4, 2010 Britton-Macon Area School will hold a Non-Homestead Renewal and Restoration Millage vote that requires voter approval. Below are answers to frequently asked questions about the millage.

#### **What does “non-homestead” mean?**

Non-homestead represents industrial, commercial, second homes, and some agricultural property. *It does not include a family's primary residence.*

#### **I thought schools no longer received funding through property taxes. If so, why are they talking about a millage renewal and restoration?**

Funding for school districts changed significantly in 1993-94 when Proposal A was passed by the Michigan voters. Under Proposal A, the state pays the majority of the cost, but to receive full funding, school districts must levy 18 mills on non-homestead property in their district.

#### **Is this a new tax?**

No. This millage was approved by voters in 1994. The district has voter approval to levy 18 mills on non-homestead property through June 2009. In order to restore the 18 mill tax on non-homestead property, a vote is required.

#### **How much will this renewal cost the average business in our community?**

It will cost the average business \$18.00 of \$1,000.00 of taxable value.

#### **Will my residential taxes increase, too?**

No. This is on non-homestead property and does not apply to your primary place of residence.

#### **How does the non-homestead millage factor into how Michigan school districts are funded?**

Districts receive most of their funding on a per-pupil basis. This represents the major portion of Britton-Macon Area School's revenue and is currently funded from two sources:

Local Revenue – 18.00 mills collected on non-homestead property

State Revenue – The funding the district receives from the state is called the “Foundation Allowance.” The Foundation Allowance is calculated using the following formula:

The number of Britton-Macon students multiplied by the per pupil amount set by the state.\*

\*The current promised per pupil amount for Britton is \$7,310, but the state has failed to meet the promise each of the last three years. We have been told that we will not receive full funding from the State again this year.

By law, to obtain the total Foundation Allowance, Britton-Macon Area School must collect a local “non-homestead” millage for this portion of its budget. The state reduces its obligation to districts by this amount and only pays the balance.

**Didn't we vote on this last year?**

Yes. The Britton-Macon Board of Education has decided to place this renewal on the ballot each year. Passing this proposal each year will ensure that we receive all of the funding promised by the state.

**What if the millage is voted down?**

The revenue generated from the 18 mills totals over \$225,000 annually. If this millage does not pass, the state will not replace the funding and Britton-Macon Area School will be forced to reduce and cut programs to offset the loss of funds.

**Where do I vote?**

The Ridgeway Township clerk is responsible for conducting the school election. All school district residents, regardless of where they live, will vote at the Ridgeway Township Hall between the hours of 7 a.m. and 8 p.m.

**Vote by Absentee Ballot**

Applications for absentee ballots are available at the Lenawee County Clerk's office or the Ridgeway Township clerk.
